Closing Remarks of Phillip Saperia 2014 Leadership Awards Reception Coalition of Behavioral Health Agencies June 19, 2014

Dr. Bassett's view of public health as social justice has energized me ever since I read about it in "Capitol Today" immediately after her appointment as Commissioner. As I thought about it, I realized that social justice is what our members, and most of you here tonight, are deeply engaged in every day.

We call it service provision, treatment, care coordination, support, rehabilitation, housing of all kinds, emergency response, crisis response, respite, family engagement, clubhouse, care giving, outreach......these are so much more than delivery of services and responses to need.

What you do for those who are vulnerable and needy, impacts the entire health of individuals, communities and whole populations.

The Coalition will continue to be ever watchful as the speeding bullet train we are riding moves toward the destination of managed care. We will make our voice heard wherever and whenever we must to impact the transition in our system of care. We will be protective and continue to assist our social safety net to be ready for the new world, because you/we know how to help people in this crucial realm of the human body and in life.

Importantly, we will keep working to help our folks collaborate with each other and with new partners. We will continue to assist them to understand and operate fully in the new business models that will face them. We will not shirk from these professional tasks.

Above all, The Coalition's critical involvement is to preserve and extend that social justice system that our members embody and that we represent. Social justice is an understanding of critical social values like equality of opportunity and recognizing the dignity of every human being. It is about making space for hope and recovery. It is about everyone, rich or poor, whatever your backgrounds. It has its roots in religion, in humanism, in secular human rights movements—all that uphold human dignity and the right for all to good holistic treatment and care.

We commit ourselves to this mission because it is right and because we are inspired by the daily acts of caring and commitment of our members, our allies in government, the advocacy world and the larger healthcare community. We are proud to stand with you.

I will take this moment to thank my fellow travelers and Coalition colleagues who professionally and personally work unsparingly to uplift that gold standard of caring: Pat Goldstein, Karyn Krampitz, Heather Mermel, Chris Bianchi, Nanci Bradshaw, Naomi Weinstein, Amanda Saake, Deborah Short, Pat Feinberg, Elizabeth Saenger, Margie Staker, Grace Mercado, and Eduardo Ronquillo.
